The Woodland Trust Scotland appreciates the opportunity to comment on the Aberdeenshire Council's Proposed Local Development Plan 2020.

The Woodland Trust is the UK's leading woodland conservation charity. We have four main aims: no further loss of ancient woodland, restoring and improving woodland biodiversity, increasing new native woodland and increasing people's understanding and enjoyment of woodland. We own over 1,000 sites across the UK, covering approximately 26,000 hectares (ha). In Scotland we own and manage over 60 sites across 10,000 ha which include the 4,000 ha Glen Finglas estate and significant holdings in Glenrothes and Livingston. We combine the promotion of public access with forestry, farming and conservation of the natural and cultural heritage. The Woodland Trust has 500,000 members and supporters.

The Woodland Trust believes that trees and woodland play a crucial role in place-making given their value to health and wellbeing, recreation, air and water quality, biodiversity, flood protection, climate adaptation and resilience, and amenity value. It is crucial that trees and woodland – as part of a wider approach to strategic green infrastructure – are protected, and their enhancement and expansion planned for from the earliest stage of the planning process to maximise these benefits.

The Woodland Trust considers that any woodland included in Scottish Natural Heritage's Ancient Woodland Inventory (AWI), which is present on historical maps or which exhibits a significant number of ancient woodland indicators can be considered as ancient and long-established and is therefore worthy of further study and is likely to pose a constraint on development.

We believe that ancient woodland is amongst the most precious and biodiverse habitats in the UK and is a finite resource which should be protected. As such, the Woodland Trust aims to prevent the damage, fragmentation and loss of these irreplaceable sites from any form of disruptive development. We achieve our aims through acquiring woodland and sites for woodland regeneration, and wider advocacy of the importance of protecting ancient woodland, enhancing its biodiversity, expanding native woodland cover and increasing public enjoyment.

PROPOSED ABERDEENSHIRE LOCAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2020 **RESPONSE FORM**

As part of the production of the Local Development Plan, a 'Main Issues Report' was published in January 2019. The responses from these consultations have helped to inform the content of the Proposed Local Development Plan ("the Proposed Plan").

The Aberdeenshire Local Development Plan will direct decision-making on land-use planning issues and planning applications in Aberdeenshire for the 10-year period from 2021 to 2031. The Proposed Plan was agreed by Aberdeenshire Council in March 2020 as the settled view of the Council. However, the Proposed Plan will be subjected to an independent examination and is now open for public comment.

This is your opportunity to tell us if anything should be changed in the Proposed Plan, and why.

When writing a response to the Proposed Plan it is important to specifically state the modification(s) that you would wish to see to the Plan.

This is the only remaining opportunity to comment on the Proposed Plan. The reasons for any requested changes will be analysed and reported to Scottish Ministers. They will then appoint a person known as a Reporter to conduct a public examination of the Proposed Plan, focusing particularly on any unresolved issues and the changes sought.

Ministers expect representations (or responses) to be concise (no more than 2000 words) and accompanied by limited supporting documents. It is important to ensure that all of the information that you wish to be considered is submitted during this consultation period as there is no further opportunity to provide information, unless specifically asked.

Modification that you wish to see (please make specific reference to the section of the Proposed Plan you wish to see modified if possible, for example Section 9, paragraph E1.1):

The Woodland Trust Scotland would welcome the acknowledgement that the loss of even individual trees and small woods, albeit gradually, has a high impact on natural heritage and biodiversity. Incremental woodland habitat fragmentation is a common issue across Scotland. Therefore we would like to see stronger commitment to the full protection of Ancient Woodland (including semi-natural woodlands e.g. LEPOs and PAWS) through a clear statement in all local planning documents that Ancient Woodland should be protected from development.

We would like to see Aberdeenshire Council refer to use the following mapping resources and process to determine the antiquity of a woodland area: the assessment should start by looking at the Ancient Woodland Inventory (AWI), then the historic OS maps 1840-60's (at six inches to the mile) should be revisited, and then the Native Woodland Survey of Scotland (NWSS) should be looked at to assess the presence of matures trees common in the canopy. A woodland survey could also be conducted where the antiquity of woodland is uncertain. The Native Woodland Survey Scotland, as well as the Ancient Woodland Inventory can be used to identify the location, extent, type and condition of native woodlands within the planning authority area. We would like to see the Planning authority use the data available in the NWSS and AWI to prepare development plans that are based on a sound and consistent basis of knowledge of native woods. Unsuitable forms of development can then be directed away from native woods for biodiversity and other benefits in order to guide planning decisions.

To this end, the Woodland Trust Scotland objects to the inclusion of the site allocations below as they are likely to cause damage and/or loss to areas of ancient woodland <u>within</u> their boundaries. For this reason, we believe the sites in the table below are unsound and should not be taken forward and therefore not included in the Local Development Plan.

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Reason for change:

Removal of woodland is contrary to two important pieces of Scottish Government policy; the Scottish Planning Policy (SPP) and the Control of Woodland Removal Policy.

The SPP states: "216. Ancient semi-natural woodland is an irreplaceable resource and, along with other woodlands, hedgerows and individual trees, especially veteran trees of high nature conservation and landscape value, should be protected from adverse impacts resulting from development. Tree Preservation Orders can be used to protect individual trees and groups of trees considered important for amenity or their cultural or historic interest."

"218. The Scottish Government's Control of Woodland Removal Policy includes a presumption in favour of protecting woodland. Removal should only be permitted where it would achieve significant and clearly defined additional public benefits. Where woodland is removed in association with development, developers will generally be expected to provide compensatory planting. The criteria for determining the acceptability of woodland removal and further information on the implementation of the policy is explained in the Control of Woodland Removal Policy, and this should be taken into account when preparing development plans and determining planning applications."

The Control of Woodland Removal Policy states: "There will be a strong presumption against removing the following types of woodland: ancient semi-natural woodland; woodlands listed as 'Plantations on Ancient Woodland Sites' (PAWS). There will also be a strong presumption against woodland removal where it would lead to fragmentation or disconnection of important forest habitat networks."

The Scottish Biodiversity Strategy (SBS), "It's in Your Hands" includes the following target and action: "*Target 3.3 Minimise losses of biodiversity occurring through fragmentation and loss of woodland due to development and other land uses.*"

The Scottish Forestry Strategy (SFS) states, "There is world-wide recognition of the importance of conserving natural forests, which provide the richest and most diverse terrestrial ecological systems. Scotland's Ancient semi natural woodlands include scarce remnants of its natural forests..."

and,

"The remaining Ancient semi-natural woodlands have a high conservation priority".

Key Theme 7: Biodiversity of the Scottish Forestry Strategy states "Ensure that the protection of woodlands of high biodiversity value is a principal consideration in the development control process."

In addition to this the SFS Implementation Plan outline programme for 2009 highlights the need to, "*Provide guidance for planners on woodland biodiversity issues and assess the feasibility of using digitised spatial data to monitor losses of high conservation woods to development.*"
